GARDEN OF READIN'...

There is much going on in our denomination right now, especially here in Iowa. I know sometimes Presbytery, not to mention the PC(USA) in Louisville, seems distant and disconnected from what we do in our little church. But Presbyterians have always believed we are better when we are a part of things larger than ourselves ó connected to diverse people and places all seeking to live faithfully. At our best, it makes us more whole, expands and deepens our understandings of God and God's will for us, and helps us do things we could never do as individual, isolated churches.

So, it should matter to us how our Presbytery (and GA) are running, and what the plans are for the future. Our Presbytery (Des Moines) has been in an interim time since the retirement of Phil Barrett over a year ago. Jim Koopman, our interim General Presbyter, has been walking us through a process much like what churches do when they are in transition.

Right now, our Presbytery is in the phase of putting together our best guess at what our mission is in this time and place so we can then decide how to best structure ourselves to live that mission out. The process has been bumpy (which is normal!), and challenging (which is good!), and I feel like so many people in our Presbytery are really óshowing upö for the conversation in honesty and with a desire to figure out how to be our best selves. In other words, the interim process is doing what it's supposed to do.

At the same time, there's a similar process going on for the whole state of Iowa, with all of the Presbyteries in the state coming together to wonder about our future as Presbyterians in Iowa, and how to best move into that future when many of our Presbyteries face similar challenges and limitations. That group decided early on to really focus on what is happening in our current context, and what it means to faithfully respond as Presbyterians in Iowa.

Again, with that mission in mind, the group is thinking about what the best structures are to live it out.

I have been blessed to be a part of both of these processesó even while our church is going through its own kind of transition. I think it's a time rich with possibilities right now. There's been enough disruption to some of the ways things have óalways been doneö that people are willing to think creatively and openly, and there's definitely enough going on in our state that cries out for people of faith to address to keep us engaged and motivated.

But I think most of all I've been struck by how the hundreds of years of Presbyterians studying, worshiping, praying, coming together, and hearing the clarion call of God to care for the poor, imprisoned, hurting, and marginalized has given us a solid foundation, allowing us to explore and risk for the future.

In all the conversations I've been in these past few years in our denomination, no one is rehashing our basic theological commitments. This has been heartening. It's not that there's 100% theological uniformity in our Presbytery, much less our whole denomination. But there's some basic things our denomination has been committed to throughout its history that still drive us today. Who are the most vulnerable, people ask, and how can we be with them in love and compassion?

I look forward to seeing what our denomination does, and sharing it with you, and I cherish the fact that I get to do that same work with you all every single day. What an incredible gift that is!

Health Services include WIC, Dental, and Maternal and Child Health.

Family Development includes FaDSS (family development), Food Pantry, Project Home Mission and Family Connections.

Housing includes LIHEAP (low income home energy assistance program) and Weatherization.

Childhood Programs include Head Start and Early Head Start.

Not all of these programs are in Poweshiek County, but they are somewhere in the five county area of Hardin, Marshall, Poweshiek, Story and Tama counties.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MAY SESSION MEETING

Reports from Working Groups

Facilities ó the parking lot has been striped. The actual cost was \$825. The increase over the quoted \$795 was due to the increased number of handicapped spaces. After a recent storm the flashing needed repairs. The cost to fasten up the flashing was \$150. Filters were changed in the furnaces.

Ray will contact the City of Grinnell regarding the dead tree in the parkway.

Repair to the Sewer Line

\$6,900 bid from German Plumbing (\$5,100) and Craig Paulson (\$1,800). This work is required regardless of which option is chosen. \$310 is required to verify elevations. This is required for either sewer line repair option chosen.

Option #1 Jason Hall \$2,785 bore and tie into the plumbing

Option #2 Jason Hall, \$3,815 trench around the church

Option #1 costs = \$6,900 + \$310 + \$2,785 = \$9,995

Option #2 costs = \$6,900 + \$310 + \$3,815 = \$10,025

No action was taken at this time. Depending upon when this work would be done, the costs could increase. When this project was reviewed last year, the funding was going to come from the operating budget. This decision may also need to be re-evaluated.

Worship -- a meeting will be convened to discuss a date for outdoor worship (late in July) and proposed blessing of the animals. Nursery volunteers should be included in the fall Sunday servants schedule. There needs to be an adult assigned when Pete Simpson and Zach Nickle are scheduled.

Education ó the Committee is still working the summer read recommendation. The last day of Sunday school will be Sunday, May 20, 2018.

Mission ó the Committee has met twice since the last Session meeting. During the meeting of April 23, time was spent reviewing the mission brochure. The brochure will be revised this summer. David Isch gave a report on "The Well," a multi-service program for those in need located in Pella.

On May 15, the Committee spent time discussing a document prepared by David Isch, organizer for Friends for International Harmony. A group of concerned citizens will meet on May 24, 2018 at 7:00 p.m. to discuss the recent ICE raid in Mt Pleasant, Iowa, and to discuss and potentially plan for a rapid response plan for Grinnell.

Motion made by the Committee to approve First Presbyterian Church, Grinnell, Iowa, to be the designated community point place for information, contacts and support. The motion passed.

The Committee is alerting the Session it may be requesting permission for fund-raising as the picture becomes clearer as to what monetary needs may be helpful.

A highway cleanup was held in May with many members helping.

Al Ricks provided statistics about attendance records of the Food Recovery Network. A concern is the program isn't meeting the needs of the working poor. They are not able to come over the noon hour.

Finance ó the next Committee will be in July, 2018.

Memorials ó Camping stipends, totaling \$600, have been distributed to Slane McCue, Hannah McCue, Miles McIntyre, Ty McIntyre, Damien Nickle and Pete Simpson. Pastor Kirsten offered to attend a future Committee meeting to help the Memorial Committee determine items they might want to move forward for session approval. Also the Committee should think about how much to draw down from the Memorial CD when it comes due in September, 2018.

Presbytery ó Commissioner Dennis Day provided a written report. Highlights included the approval to inquirer status seeking to become a minister of word and sacrament for Hannah Lundberg, member, First Presbyterian Church, Grinnell, Iowa. Ekram Kachu was certified "ready" to be ordained as a minister of word and sacrament and was approved to be installed as ordained pastor of 1st Arabic Presbyterian Church of Des Moines. Pastor Nate Williams, former inquirer from our church, preached the sermon during the morning worship service. The five churches with the greatest per member giving for general mission were recognized. First Presbyterian Church, Grinnell, was first with giving per member at \$93.46.

Unfinished Business

Hosting Presbytery ó Char attended the Presbytery meeting on May 15, 2018 in Oskaloosa, IA to observe the details of the day. Our church will host the next Presbytery meeting on Saturday, August 18, 2018. Char and Donna Ricks will meet later this month to set up a spreadsheet of duties and resources. We will need to recruit persons from the Sunday servant sheet and the hospitality teams.

New Business

Pastor's Report



MISSION COMMITTEE

The Mission Committee has been meeting regularly to bring focus and clarity to our work. We represent our church members as we plan mission which is sustainable and meaningful to the needs in our congregation, community, and the world. Our meetings have focused on defining our "own mission," clarifying priorities, revising our mission brochure, and conversations about the work of the Food Recovery Network and Friends for International Harmony. Committee members include **David Isch, Tom Moore, Linda Cranston, David Cranston, Susan McIntyre, Selva Lehman, Al Ricks, Creede McClellan, and Chris Day, chair.**

In a report given by the Presbytery's Stewardship and Mission Interpretation Committee Grinnell First Presbyterian ranks first out of 54 Presbyterian Churches in our Presbytery in per member giving to Presbyterian General Mission. In a total congregation of 107 members, we gave \$10,000.00 (we increased our giving in 2018.) Only two other churches gave a total exceeding this amount. Each of these churches has larger congregations of 190 and 183 members. We were recognized at the stated Presbytery meeting last week, along with Windsor Heights, Ankeny, Dallas Center, and Allerton.

100 + PEOPLE SUPPORT LOCAL FOODS CONNECTION

The April 24 meeting of 100 + People Who Care ó Grinnell resulted in the decision to fund the Local Food Connection with the proceeds from the selection process. By pooling contributions of \$ 100 per member, 100 + People Who Care ó Grinnell will be contributing more than \$ 8,000 to fund Local Food Connection's important work. Local Food Connection is a newer, volunteer-led organization that seeks to link local food producers to low income clients by offering credits at farmers' markets, subsidized CSA shares for clients, and bulk deliveries to service organizations, such as MICA and Station Clubhouse. Local Food Connection depends on monetary contributions to be able to purchase food items from local producers at fair-market prices.

As noted in the last newsletter, the funds channeled through the church to support the Ethiopian veterinary medicine project transferred to Mekelle University in Ethiopia on May 1. These funds will be used to help equip new DVM graduates, with the items to be presented to the students at their graduation ceremony in June.

Al Ricks received immediate e-mail thank you notes from professors at Mekelle University, directed to the University's "Friends in Iowa." Dr. Netsanet Berhe, the coordinator of Veterinary Extension projects, responded: "Thank you for your dedication to support our DVM graduating students here in Mekelle University. We are using the funds for the intended mission of providing the equipment to the new DVM graduating students! God bless you all!" Dr. Birhanu Hadush, Professor of Tropical Diseases and Zoonoses (and one of the Ethiopian professors who studied at Iowa State University this past fall) responded: "Thank you all very much! This is a blessing! You are reaching to hands and hearts of many Ethiopians. Wow! We will be doing our best to deliver your gifts to the hands of our next generation professionals!"

Dr. Birhanu also reported that two professors from Iowa State will be visiting Mekelle University in early June, as part of the international exchange, and four professors from Mekelle have applied for the African Scholars Program, in hopes of spending the fall semester at Iowa State.

CONGRATULATIONS, HANNAH LUNDBERG!

At our last stated Presbytery meeting, Hannah was received as an "Inquirer" by the Des Moines Presbytery. This is an official designation for those thinking about becoming a Minister of Word and Sacrament in our denomination. It is the first step (in a LONG process!) whereby the Presbytery recognizes that someone has the support of a local congregation and a sense of call that has been affirmed by their faith community, so is ready to explore ordination with the judicatory. Hannah will meet with the Committee on Preparation regularly to talk about ordination, what it means to her, and to explore together whether it is the right thing for her and our denomination. It won't surprise you to know that she blew them out of the water! ☺

She will have at least a year as an Inquirer, then the Presbytery will decide whether she can be a "Candidate," a phase that lasts at least two years, ending in ordination if all goes well. Hannah will attend Union Theological Seminary this Fall, and our congregation will continue to sponsor and support her in this process.
